WILDMAN OF ORFORD RETURNS TO ORFORD CASTLE after more than 900 years

Many people know the story of the Wild Man of Orford who was picked up in the nets of local fishermen, not long after Orford Castle was built in 1165. To coincide with the *Son et Lumière* on 14 August, Orford Museum invited local schools to take part in a project to commemorate this story.

Orford Primary School, along with Snape and Bawdsey, rose to the challenge. At Orford, every pupil in the school was involved over two days, creating five models of the Wildman which tell the tale of his life: his capture, his imprisonment in the castle and his propensity to eat raw fish, his bafflement at being taken to church and his eventual escape back to the sea.

The exhibition will be on the main floor of the Castle from midday on Thursday 13 August until closing time on Sunday 16 August and we do hope as many people as possible will go to see it. English Heritage have kindly offered free entry to all children

who took part, along with three family members. For others, if you are a Friend of the Museum you also get free access, as do English Heritage members.

HOUSING IN ORFORD

You may have read the article in June's Village Voice regarding housing and how people might be able to help with New Orford Town Trust's (Charity no 1053729) efforts to ensure that there are reasonably priced rental properties in Orford to enable local people to remain in the village.

Did you know that there are tax advantages in giving to NOTT's Housing Fund, in addition to ensuring that the local village community can carry on living and working here as their fathers did before them?

This is one of the few instances of there being advantages for all.

For example:

- Making a donation of, say, £100 and signing a gift aid form will mean that NOTT Housing Fund can claim a further £25 from HMRC (25% of any gift). If you are a higher rate tax payer there is a higher rate element.
- There are further advantages if you leave a charitable donation in your will. The charitable gift will be deducted from your estate before inheritance tax is applied. By doing this, you would be ensuring your personal choice of where your money goes and not letting the taxman completely decide!

As highlighted in June's Village Voice, caring as we do for this village and its character, for both prosperity and the past's sake, we need to ensure that people with local connections are not forced out, keeping the pulse of Orford going for generations to come. As the number of second homes increase and locals move away to find affordable accommodation our community assets become threatened: the school, fire station, council, social club, shop, pubs and church.

A parish councillor was recently talking to a parishioner who pointed out there seemed to be a lot of jobs with no one to fill them. It was pointed out that houses that are occupied year round would be far more beneficial to the local economy than a house only occupied for part of the year, as well as being helpful to local businesses.

Just think, by making a donation:

- You are giving money to a local charity run by local people, ensuring that families and the village as a whole will benefit.
- Your donation will not disappear into some administrative abyss, its effect will be felt in real terms in perpetuity and that surely must give satisfaction.

EASTERN ANGLES AT ORFORD TOWN HALL

3 September

One of the most influential British novels of the twentieth century, *The Go-Between* is a story of forbidden love, Edwardian strictures, betrayal and tragic naivety. Told from the perspective of Leo Colston, a callow twelve-year-old middle-class boy, the story starts when he is invited by upper-class school friend Marcus Maudsley to stay at his elegant family home for the summer of 1900. Leo is enthralled by Marcus's family, and most especially his beautiful and wilful older sister Marian.

When Marcus is taken ill, Leo is left to his own devices, but finds himself alone and adrift in a world of alien social mores and adult concerns. Gauche and anxious to please, Leo is drawn into a web of deceit as Marian pursues an illicit and passionate affair with tenant farmer Ted Burgess, a man of much inferior social position whom she can never marry. Marian and Ted befriend the lonely and easily influenced Leo and use him to carry secret messages between them until Leo starts to question his role as intermediary. As Leo's thirteenth birthday approaches, and unable to comprehend the true implications of the adult emotions seething around him, Leo sets in motion a chain of events that ultimately prove the catalyst for a shocking tragedy that will haunt him forever.

Friday 14 August 2026: *Son et Lumière* at Orford Castle

This event is now sold out but there is a waiting list on the Events page of our website at www.orfordmuseum.org.uk. However, as well as the *Son et Lumière* performance, Jamie Lee Smith Catering will be offering a wide variety of exciting street food and drink. Peter Manning: Medieval Music and Song

Orford Museum presents a medieval medley of music from 1320 to 1530 with soprano Angela Hicks and tenor Daniel Thomson accompanied by Sam Browne on the lute and theorbo, and Mary Robertson on vielle. The performance will take place at Butley Priory and has been generously arranged by Peter Manning, conductor, music director, commissioner, educator and arts advocate. Peter Manning has organised and collaborated with prestigious musical festivals throughout the UK and Europe and has worked with the BBC Symphony Orchestra, Dallas Opera, the Royal Philharmonic and Malta Philharmonic Orchestras. As artistic director and principal conductor, Peter Manning guided the re-invention of the Bath Festival Orchestra into the Chromatic Orchestra.

Tickets for this event cost £50 a head for both Friends, their guests and non-Friends, to include prosecco and canapés. Doors will be open at 5.45pm for a prompt 6.30pm start.

Tuesday, 20 October at 6pm to 7pm at Butley Priory

John Goodall - *Country Life* at 130 years

The first issue of *Country Life* appeared on 8 January 1897. As the magazine approaches its 130th year as a successful weekly publication, John Goodall will look at its early history and the figures involved with its foundation. In particular it will consider the evolution of its coverage of country houses and the distinctive tradition of architectural photography that it has developed. John Goodall is the architectural editor of *Country Life*. His books include *God's House at Ewelme* (2001), *The English Castle* (2011) and *Parish Church Treasures* (2015). He is a fellow of the Society of Antiquaries and sits on the fabric advisory committees of several great churches.

On Monday, 2 November, Alison Weir will make a welcome return to Butley Priory to talk about her novel, *Cardinal: the Secret Life of Thomas Wolsey* and on Tuesday 8 December there will be a showing of two short Suffolk films, *Merman* written and directed by Madeleine Wynn, and *The Dog That Couldn't Bark* directed by Henry Tomlinson followed by a question-and-answer session.

Full details of all these talks and how to book can be found on the Events page of our website.

Looking ahead to 2027, on Tuesday 12 January Simon Sturgis AADip. RIBA, an architect who is a leading expert on carbon emissions in the built environment, will give a talk entitled 'Architecture and the Climate Crisis: how the past can save the future', and on Thursday, 4 February Dr Tobias Capwell will talk about the Bayeux Tapestry. As the result of an historic agreement with France, the Tapestry will form the centrepiece of a major exhibition at the British Museum opening on Thursday 10 September 2026 (until July 2027).

Booking for these two talks will open shortly.

Our annual, three-day History Festival will take place on Thursday, 25, Friday 26 and Saturday 27 February 2027. This is still in the planning stage but we already have some exciting speakers lined up to give talks on a wide variety of topics. We are also planning talks for March and April 2027 so watch our website for details!
